

Europe's environment 2025 | Communication overview

Every five years, as mandated in its founding regulation, the European Environment Agency (EEA) publishes its flagship report on the state of Europe's environment. 'Europe's environment 2025' report is the 7th edition of such reports (previously known as SOER) since 1995.

About the report

Publication date: **29 September 2025**

Title of the overall flagship report: ***'Europe's environment 2025'***

- Tag line *'Knowledge on environment, climate and sustainability'* can be used on owned media (website, visuals, etc.) as appropriate. It is not part of the report title.

The overall report has three parts:

- **Main report: *'Europe's environment and climate: knowledge for resilience, prosperity and sustainability'***
 - About 200 pages, including references.
 - provides an integrated narrative about how environment and climate deliver for people, anchored in the EU's visions for a sustainable Europe by 2050.
 - Includes an Executive summary (appr. 4 pages).
- **Thematic briefings:**
 - Provide a concise and comparable overview of past trends, an outlook to 2030, and an assessment of prospects for meeting EU policy targets for 35 topics on environment and climate as well as enablers for a green transformation.
- **Country profiles:**
 - Provide concise country level assessments written by the countries themselves on key national trends in environment and climate, socio-economic developments, and changes in relation to energy, mobility and food.

Notes:

- "SOER", "State and outlook report", should not be used in external communication.
- The country profiles have been co-developed by the EEA and countries. They do not constitute an assessment of progress by the EEA and should not be confused with the country reports prepared by the European Commission as part of the Environmental Implementation Review.

Why is the report noteworthy?

- 'Europe's environment 2025' draws on the latest scientific evidence and is underpinned by the most comprehensive data on environment, climate and sustainability available in Europe – both temporally and spatially.
- The report data comes from and is validated by 38 countries (EU and non-EU). More than 600 national partner institutions contribute to the EEA's work that is the basis for the report's robust and reliable data and analysis.
