European Environment Agency 'State of the Environment Report 2015'

The European Environment Agency (EEA) is mandated in its governing regulation to publish a <u>State of the Environment Report</u> every five years, to address the state of, trends in, and prospects for the environment in Europe. The next edition of this report will be published in March 2014 with an official Brussels launch on 4th March.

The product includes two main reports, a synthesis and an assessment of global megatrends along with a suite of 87 short thematic, country-level and cross-country comparison briefings. The product has been developed in close collaboration with both the EEA member and cooperating countries and the European Commission.

The EEA take responsibility for promoting and communicating the product within the Commission and Environmental Information and Observation Network (Eionet) partners facilitate the delivery of the messages within their countries. Previously, UK efforts at promoting SOER had been focused around government. For 2015 we are making a first attempt to engage with academia to bring these data sources to a wider audience potentially stimulating further data usage and research. The planned events at the York Environmental Sustainability Institute and the Lancaster Environment Centre mark the first in what we hope will be a series of seminars throughout 2015.
